

### **Great Waters Expo**

The Great Waters Expo was held March 15-17 at Hamlin University in the Twin Cities again this year. 
## Hiawatha TU March Members Meeting

About 25 members of Hiawatha TU and more online heard from Mike Toft of <u>whitewaterguiding.com</u> who is passionate about Euronymphing that is a growingly popular way to fish trout and maybe catch a lot of them. Euronymphing is done using a long - 10- to 10.5-foot long rod, very thin line and a nymph or some other fly. The big thing is that it keeps the line, except for the tippet and fly, off the water so it has fewer problems with drift. Instead of a typical indicator, it uses indicator line called a sighter that is part of the line.

There are several kinds including Polish and French, which do it a bit differently, so they are just called Euronymphing. In many cases, the flies are much heavier to fish fast water and avoid the need for extra weights. All Euronymphing rigs have a 20-foot leader, he said. They can be fished in big and small streams, from a foot to several feet of water. It's also common to get doubles. "Once you get this technique down, it's deadly," he said. But you can't make really long casts with it; you sort of flip it, not cast it, and you can't do roll casts.


Toft said he began as a professional bass fisherman but once he tried Euronymphing, he sold his bass gear because the new system is so effective. "I am a complete nerd on





this," he said. He builds his own line, using a tippet ring to attach the tippet material that can be as light as 7X. But the rods are light, around 3-weight but have soft tips to help with the feel of the fish and absorb the power of even trophy fish. While the tip is sensitive, the butt is stouter to help play bigger fish.

Toft uses only a few flies, including perdigon, mop and streamers. But here's a crucial thing: PRESENTATION TRUMPS PATTERN. It's possible to fish very close to fish; he once caught 29 trout standing in one place. He and a friend have caught more than 100 fish in a day, he said. The system works especially well in faster water out west, he said. Some carry two rods, but he doesn't like that because it's too easy to lose one; instead, he changes spools or entire reels.





Fly of the month is a simple carp fly that is very effective. With the carp ponds unthawed now and the water warming up, carp will be getting more active. Spring is a great time to target carp on the fly since they will be up shallow. I like to call this fly the Carp Crawler.

Ingredients for the fly are: TMC 708 size 8 Red Veevus 8/0 thread Large bead chain eye UV shrimp pink dubbing MFC Bunny Brush in olive

## **Monthly Fishing Reports**

### Lanesboro MN: <u>Root River Rod Co</u>

Trout fishing the last couple weeks have been fantastic for anyone looking to us dry flies. We have been seeing a great Stonefly hatch, Midge hatch and Blue Wing Olives are starting to show up. The streamer bite has also been great too. Water is still very low and clear but most days there is a great hatch and the fish are not as spooky. Recommended Flies:

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#20-18 Sparkle Midge#16-12 Black Stonefly Dry or Nymph#18 Blue Wing Olive Dry FlyMini Dungeons, White, Olive or Brown

### **Decorah IA: Bear Creek Anglers**

Nothing new to report regarding water levels and conditions—as low and clear as before with spooky fish. Fishing overcast conditions is as beneficial as ever as well as fishing longer and lighter tippets.

With an early spring has come an early arrival of BWO hatches with strong midge hatches more days than not. Fishing dry patterns such as BWOs, Adam's, Griffith's gnats, and other small midges in sizes 18-20 are a good start. Dropping a softhackle or small emerger behind your dry is a good idea.

When nymphing, we're having success on smaller prince and pheasant tail patterns (sizes 16-18), zebra midges (size 16-18), pink squirrel (size 16), and caddis/cased caddis (size 16-18). Fishing small leech patterns in size 12-16 dead drifted, stripped, or with a slight twitch action are also remaining effective.
